Bastrop County burn ban extended through Oct. 15

With no significant rainfall forecasted for the area, Bastrop County Judge Gregory Klaus extended the current burn ban through Oct. 15.

Who is affected?

Residents living within unincorporated areas of the county are prohibited from any outdoor burning until the order is lifted.

What you need to know

According to the burn ban order, enforcement for outdoor fires includes:

- Response from the fire department to extinguish the fire
- An investigation into the nature of the fire, which can result in a citation for violating the burn ban
- A fine of up to \$500

How we got here

As of Sept. 25, Bastrop County is at a Keetch-Byram Drought Index of 610.

The Texas A&M Forest Service website explains that this level indicates a high potential for wildfires that can show extreme intensity.

As stated in the Aug. 26 Bastrop County commissioners agenda packet, the KBDI average for the county jumped from 338 to 512 from Aug. 7-20, which initiated the original burn ban. Since then, the county has not received any significant rainfall.



<u>Texas Secretary of State</u> recently removed 1.1 million from the Texas voter rolls. Some people discovered that they were erroneously removed. Even if you haven't voted in the last two election cycles you may have been removed or suspended. You can check to see if you are still registered online at the link below and under "Am I Registered" just enter ID or name, birthdate, County. Recipe of the Month:

Chicken and Bacon Pasta with Spinach and Tomatoes in Garlic Cream Sauce

Ingredients:

- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 lb chicken (skinless, boneless chicken breasts or tenderloins)
- 1 teaspoon paprika
- 1 teaspoon Italian seasoning (thyme, oregano, basil combined) salt to taste.
- 1.5 cups heavy cream
- ½ cup Parmesan cheese shredded
- 5 tomatoes (medium, chopped in large cubes)
- 3 cups fresh spinach or 1 cup cooked spinach.
- 5 garlic cloves minced.
- 1/4 teaspoon red pepper flakes crushed
- 6 bacon strips cooked, drained off fat, and chopped.
- 10 oz penne pasta (for gluten-free version, use gluten-free brown-rice penne)
- ½ cup Parmesan cheese shredded, for serving


Instructions:

- 1. Heat 2 tablespoons of olive oil in a large skillet, on medium-high heat. Add chicken and cook on one side on medium-high heat for 4 minutes. While it cooks, sprinkle the uncooked sides of the chicken with paprika, Italian seasoning, and salt. Flip the chicken over and cook on the other side for 3 more minutes on medium-high heat. Reduce heat to low-medium, flip chicken over again and cook, covered, for several minutes until no longer pink in the center. Remove chicken from the pan and keep chicken warm.
- 2. To the same pan (but without chicken), add heavy cream and bring to boil. Only after the heavy cream starts boiling, add shredded Parmesan cheese. Immediately reduce to simmer (low-medium heat) and stir, while simmering, until the cheese melts and the sauce is creamy, for about 1 or 3 minutes.
- 3. To the same pan with the creamy sauce, add chopped tomatoes, fresh spinach, garlic, crushed red pepper. Stir in the sauce on medium heat just until the spinach starts to wilt and sinks into the sauce. Add $\frac{1}{3}$ of the cooked chicken (sliced into small strips)

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and half the bacon (already cooked and drained of fat). Mix everything. Remove from heat.

- 4. In the meantime, bring a large pot of water to boil, add pasta, and cook according to instructions (usually 10 to 15 minutes). Drain the pasta.
- 5. Add cooked pasta to the skillet with the sauce and reheat on low heat. When ready to serve, top the pasta with the remaining half of bacon (cooked, drained of fat, chopped, gently reheated) and the remaining $\frac{2}{3}$ of the cooked chicken (sliced into small strips, gently reheated). This is done for presentation purposes.
- 6. When serving, top the pasta with ½ cup of shredded Parmesan cheese.
